McMinn County

Well, thanks for letting us share with you here through our Regional Newsletter!
Our four clubs vary in size so naturally some are more active and involved with projects than others. But, all the clubs participate in the quarterly County Council Meetings and our community service projects, as well as our fun outings.

We were intrigued at the Sequoyah Birthplace Museum in Vonore, TN. Never before, or since, in the history of the world has one man, not literate in any language, perfected a system for reading and writing a language.

Niota is the home of Crescent Sock Factory. Sounds kind of routine until you understand it was founded by James L. Burn in 1902, and continues to operate today, still family owned and now operated by his great granddaughters. You have no idea what all is involved in making a sock until you've been on a tour.

And yes, this is the same Burn family whose 24 year old statesman son cast the deciding vote allowing women to vote in Tennessee. Harry T. Burn from Niota, TN in McMinn County took his mother's advice to "Do the right thing" back in 1920. When it ratified the 19th Amendment, Tennessee was the deciding vote to allow women to vote nationally.

Some of our members gladly read Dr. Seuss books to eager ears at Keith Children's Academy. In July, our families joined together for our annual summer indoor picnic spread.

A fun bus load will be heading to Knoxville for the Tennessee Valley Fair for FCE and Senior Day to enjoy all it entails including exhibits, displays, food, programs, prizes, and entertainment.

We openly share our resources, money, and goods with local ministries and nonprofits such as Clean Living Athens and Women at the Well, both drug and alcohol freeing residential places for women; Isaiah 1:17 for children, Full Circle Medical Center for women and unplanned pregnancies, as well as the Hope Center, a place of help and hope for battered women.

Our Agent, Sarah Kite, arranges multiple programs open to the community and us such as Tai Chi for arthritis and diabetes prevention, walking, excercising, and cooking classes. Also, individuals and teams of 4 are "Walking Across TN" right at home.

Two of our clubs have been blessed with a couple of new members. Each of the women are interesting and delightful additions that we warmly welcome.



McMinn County continued

Claxton, our largest club, is seemingly the most active. It has been meeting continuously in our community for at least 103 years. Originally the Agent helped the farm women survive. Now we do service projects for the community. We collect personal hygiene and assorted items such as shampoo, word search books, bingo prizes, purses, activity aprons, lap throws, etc. for health facilities where there is a need.

Just this year we have given 134 plush fleece blankets and throws (each with a machine embroidered picture on it) to fire stations, county police cruisers, Veterans Office, the Shower Bus, and Children's Advocacy Center. Including last year's distribution, we've given a total of 554 of the awesome throws.

The county Health Departments were thrilled when we delivered 150 Boo Boo bags for children getting shots.

So far this year, we have gathered and used sewing scraps and foam pieces to make 91 cat and dog beds for animal shelters. We try to make use of everything we get and have fun doing it.
