Purpose

The purpose of the project exhibit is to provide 4-H All Stars an additional opportunity to share ideas accomplishments, requirements and/or results of special studies or research in their 4-H project.

Rules

1. Any active 4-H All Star who attends the State 4-H All Star Conference may enter one exhibit in the competition.

2. Exhibits must be displayed on a 3' x 3' tabletop. The area from the table top to the floor may also be utilized.

3. Members are encouraged to make their exhibits "free standing," since it may not be possible for each table to be against the wall.

4. Exhibits will be scored according to the 4-H Educational Display score sheet.

Awards

A first place plaque will be awarded to the All Star with the highest scoring exhibit. The top five exhibitors will receive a \$25 award. All exhibits will be classified into blue and red award groups.

Who May Attend

Each county may send one active volunteer leader per eight (or major fraction thereof) members attending Roundup.

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DRESS CODE

Category A – Assembly

Ladies: Skirt, dress capris, slacks, nice shirt or polo Gentlemen: Slacks, nice shirt or polo

Category B – Business

Ladies: Nice dress or suit Gentlemen: Slacks, shirt and tie, jacket optional

Category C – Casual

Ladies: Shorts (mid-thigh length), capris, skirts, jeans or slacks Gentlemen: Shorts (mid-thigh length), jeans or slacks

Category D – Dressy

Ladies: Nice dress or party dress Gentlemen; Shirt/tie, suit/sports coat and dress slacks

The following clothing items are NOT permitted:

EXPLANATION OF SCORE SHEET

A. GENERAL APPEARANCE

The objects displayed should be a good selection, avoiding the use of too many objects. The mood of the display should be controlled by color. Colors of equal carrying power which fade together when viewed from a distance are avoided. The display should be attractively arranged with good utilization of space. Scores may vary from O to 15 for this category.

B. POWER TO ATTRACT AND HOLD ATTENTION

Posters and printed matter should be used sparingly. The display should be simple. Any action would focus attention into its proper place. Lighting effects should add interest and not distract from the message. Scores may vary from O to 25 for this category.

C. MESSAGE TOLD

The display message should be appropriate for the audience which will be viewing it. The display should sell its message. The message should be brief - to the point and aimed at audience. A well-worded message, clearly explained, is necessary. Action should be stimulated. Sc

D. UNITY IN PRESENTING MESSAGE

Only one idea should be expressed at a time. Printed matter should be placed on or near eye level. Printed material reads from left to right. All items which are not immediately understandable are labeled. Scores may vary from O - 15 in this category.

E. QUALITY OF WORKMANSHIP

The lettering should be large, plain, clean and legible. Objects and props should be secured substantially. Each item should be shown against a background with suitable contrast of texture, line, value or color. All models should be of comparable size. Scores may range from O - 10 points.

F. CREATIVITY

The idea should be timely. Appropriate props (panels, curtains, background, etc.) should be used. The exhibit should be **full** of appeal and gather comments on being unique. Nothing should be added merely to "decorate." For most impact, a display's message should be keyed to the location. For instance, the bank lobby display might read: "Invest in the future - help **4-H**" or "give time with interest." Scores may vary from O - 10 points on creativity.

Eligibility of Candidates

To be eligible to run for an office, 4-H members must have been approved for membership in the Tennessee 4-H Honor Club prior to Roundup.

- 1. Any candidate for junior representative must be an upcoming junior in high school at the time of election.
- 2. Any candidate for senior representative must be an upcoming senior in high school at the time of election.
- 3. Any candidate for representative-at-large must be a member of a minority group, complete the application process and be an upcoming junior or senior in high school at the time of 4-H Roundup.

Campaigning Information

- 1. Campaign signs may be placed on the following areas ONLY:
 - a. Bulletin boards in the common areas (using painters tape only)
 - b. Walls along the dorm corridors (using painters tape only)
 - c. Glass surfaces are off limits!
 - d. Cannot post on any entrance/exit doors to the building.
- 2. There will be no campaign materials or campaigning within 15 feet of the voting tables.
- 3. Run a "clean" campaign. Campaign materials should not be placed where damage to the wall, floor, or other surface may occur. All candidates are responsible for removing all campaign materials no later than Thursday at 5:00 p.m.

Speeches

- 1. Candidates for junior representative will be asked to give a speech during the Monday night regional meeting.
- 2. Candidates for representative-at-large **will not** give a speech nor will they be "elected" by their peers. Names of individuals will be submitted and they will be interviewed by a panel of judges during the Wednesday morning assembly.
- 3. Candidates for president and vice-president will deliver a two-minute speech at the Wednesday morning assembly. No questions will be allowed after the speeches.
- 4. Candidates for president and vice-president will deliver a one-minute speech at the Thursday morning assembly. Each presidential candidate will be asked one question following his/her speech. This question will be asked by the presiding officer of the assembly.

Regional election:

- 1. Each region will elect two junior representatives during their regional meeting on Monday night.
- 2. Each region will elect two senior representatives (one candidate for president and one candidate for vice-president) during their regional meeting on Monday night. Regions should elect their presidential candidate prior to electing their vice-presidential candidate. The person receiving the second highest number of votes in the regional election for the vice-presidential candidate will become that region's alternate. The alternate will join State 4-H Council in the event the regional presidential nominee is elected State 4-H Council President.

State election:

- 1. Elections will take place after the Thursday morning assembly.
- 2. Each delegate will vote for two candidates for vice-president and two candidates for president.
- 3. A run-off election may be necessary between the top two candidates receiving the most votes for either election if a clear majority is not found. At that point all delegates will again with only one vote for each election.

*All official Tennessee 4-H delegates and officers to Roundup are eligible to vote in the elections.

Everyone registered at Roundup participates in all Roundup activities as outlined in the program. The Roundup agenda is **everyone's** agenda.

ROOMS:

If there is any damage to the room when checking in, alert the region agent in charge of housing otherwise you are liable for any damage before checking out.

Keep your room neat and orderly and your door locked at all times. Respect property and Facilities used during Roundup and assume financial responsibility for any damage caused.

LOST KEYS:

There will be a \$55 charge for regular keys and \$25 charge for the electronic key card.

LIVING GROUPS:

Meetings are held nightly. Everyone is expected to attend. Be on time!

LIGHTS OUT!

Means everyone (delegates, leaders, and agents not assigned to housing) must be in their own assigned room with lights out and no noise.

DRESS CODE:

TRANSPORTATION:




CELL PHONES:
