HORSE JUDGING

Horse Judging trains young people in decision-making skills related to equine selection. 4-H members learn:

- How to evaluate the conformation of different types and breeds of horses.
- How to evaluate the performance of different types and breeds of horses.
- How to defend their placings through the delivery of oral reasons.

Eligibility: See the Judging Team Eligibility Table located in the Region Related section under Judging Teams.

General Rules:

A team will consist of three to four members, with the top three scores being combined to make up the team score. The team members will evaluate the conformation and/or performance of a variety of equine breeds. Examples include: Quarter Horse Mares, Stock Horse Geldings, Conformation Hunters, Walking Horse Conformation, etc. Examples of performance classes are: Western Pleasure, Hunter Under Saddle, Hunter Hack, Plantation Pleasure, Reining, etc. A class will consist of four horses. **Senior High contestants will be required to give 2 sets of oral reasons.** Junior or Junior High contestants may participate in a reasons contest as well.

Regional Contests:

The Eastern Region Horse Judging Contest is usually held in April.

State Contest:

The State Contest will take place in conjunction with the TN 4-H Horse Championships in Shelbyville in June. The top four placing Senior High teams from the Regional Contests will qualify for this contest.

Southern Regional Contest:

The top two placing teams in the State Contest receive an automatic berth in the Southern Regional 4-H Horse Championships contest, traditionally held the first week of August. The location of the contest rotates among the 13 Southern Region states.

National Contest or Tour:

The top placing Senior High team will earn an automatic berth in the Eastern National Horse Judging contest, held in Louisville, Kentucky. This contest is held in November.
